REVEALED Special Study- Endure, Not Escape

To say that it is not about escaping, but enduring is a key theological insight about the **nature of God's kingdom** in Revelation. Many people mistakenly read Revelation as a **divine escape plan**—a book about leaving this world behind and going to heaven. But Revelation presents a **very different vision**: it shows God's kingdom **coming down to earth**, calling His people to be **faithful witnesses** who participate in His work now.

1. Revelation Ends with Heaven Coming to Earth (Not Us Escaping)

- Many assume that the Christian hope is going to heaven when we die, but Revelation's grand conclusion is about God renewing creation and dwelling with His people on earth.
- Revelation 21:1-3: "Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth... And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and He will dwell with them."
- The **New Jerusalem comes down** from heaven—this is not an escape **from** the world but **the transformation of it**.

"The great climax of Revelation is not disembodied souls floating in the clouds but God dwelling with humans in a renewed creation." (Surprised by Hope)

2. The Call to Endurance: The Church's Role in Bringing the Kingdom Now

- If Revelation were only about escaping, it wouldn't include so many calls for the Church to endure and bear witness.
- Revelation 2-3: The letters to the seven churches challenge believers to stay faithful in the face of persecution, to resist compromise, and to overcome.
- Revelation 12:11:

"They triumphed over [the enemy] by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony."

The **faithful endurance** of God's people is part of how God's kingdom comes **on earth as it is in heaven**.

3. Partnering with God Means Living as Kingdom People Now

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If Revelation is about **God's reign coming to earth**, then the Church is called to **live now in light of that future reality**:

- Resisting the Beast's way (power, greed, injustice, idolatry).
- Living by the Lamb's way (faithfulness, worship, justice, love).
- Bearing witness to Jesus in a world that follows other kings.

Revelation 5:10:

"You have made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God, and they will reign on the earth."

This is not just a **future hope**—it's a **present calling**.

4. The Lord's Prayer Aligns with Revelation's Vision

When Jesus taught His disciples to pray, He said:

"Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." (Matthew 6:10)

Revelation reveals what this prayer looks like fulfilled:

- God's reign breaking into history.
- God's justice overcoming oppression.
- God's people holding fast in faith.
- A future where heaven and earth are made one.

Revelation doesn't tell us to **sit back and wait** for God to snatch us away—it tells us to **stand firm, bear witness, and live today as if Jesus is already King** (because He is!).

Final Thought: What This Means for Us Today

Since God's kingdom is coming to earth, our calling as followers of Jesus is not to escape but to engage:

- We resist **beastly systems** of greed, violence, and injustice.
- We live as people of the Lamb, marked by worship, love, and faithfulness.
- We work toward God's renewal—not by our own strength, but by the power of His Spirit.

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Instead of longing for an **exit**, we long for God's presence **here**. Instead of waiting to be **rescued**, we live **as citizens of the kingdom now**. Because **one day, the King will make all things new**—and we are called to start living that reality **today**.
