#### The Lamb has already overcome.

This statement is at the heart of **Revelation's message of hope**. While the book describes **suffering, persecution, and spiritual warfare**, its central encouragement is this:

The battle is already won.

The Lamb has already overcome, meaning:

- 1. Jesus has already conquered through His death and resurrection.
- 2. The Church's endurance is not about achieving victory—it's about living in the victory Christ has already won.
- 3. Our struggles are temporary, but Christ's triumph is eternal.

Revelation calls believers to **faithful endurance** by fixing their eyes on this truth:

• We are not fighting for victory—we are fighting from victory.

# 1. The Lamb Has Already Overcome (Revelation 5:5-6, 12:11)

# A. The Paradox of Victory: The Lion Who is a Lamb

The turning point of Revelation occurs in **Revelation 5**, when John weeps because **no one is worthy to open the scroll of history**. But then, one of the elders tells him:

*"Weep no more; behold, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered (nikaō), so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals."* (**Revelation 5:5, ESV**)

John expects to see **a Lion**, a powerful conquering king. Instead, he sees something completely unexpected:

"And between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders I saw a Lamb standing, as though it had been slain." (**Revelation 5:6, ESV**)

This redefines what true victory looks like:

- Jesus has conquered, not by force but by sacrifice.
- His death was not a defeat—it was the means of victory.
- The Lamb reigns precisely because He was slain.

The encouragement for believers is clear:

- If the Lamb's victory came through faithfulness in suffering, then our victory comes the same way.
- We do not need to fear tribulation, because Jesus has already conquered through it.

## B. The Lamb's Victory is Shared by His Followers (Revelation 12:11)

Later in Revelation, believers are described as overcoming in the same way that Jesus did:

"And they have conquered (nikaō) him by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony, for they loved not their lives even unto death." (**Revelation 12:11, ESV**)

This verse reveals how the Church overcomes the enemy:

- 1. By the blood of the Lamb Jesus' death has already secured victory over Satan.
- 2. By the word of their testimony Believers overcome not by force, but by faithfully bearing witness to Christ.
- 3. By not loving their lives even unto death They conquer by refusing to give in to fear or compromise.

This means:

- The Church's endurance is rooted in Jesus' completed work.
- Satan has already lost—his power is only in deception and intimidation.

#### Michael Gorman: The Church Overcomes by Following the Lamb

Michael Gorman, in *Reading Revelation Responsibly*, explains:

"The Lamb's victory is not just **for** the Church—it is a model **for** the Church. Just as Jesus overcame through faithfulness, the Church is called to conquer in the same way—not by violence or political power, but by unwavering testimony and sacrificial love." (*Reading Revelation Responsibly*, p. 125)

This is the ultimate encouragement: The Lamb has already won, and we share in His victory when we remain faithful.

# 2. What Does it Mean That the Lamb Has Overcome?

#### A. Jesus Has Already Defeated the Powers of Evil

- In Revelation, the Dragon (Satan), the Beast (worldly power), and Babylon (corrupt culture) all seem strong.
- But Jesus has already conquered them through His cross and resurrection.

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"Now is the judgment of this world; now will the ruler of this world be cast out." (John 12:31, ESV)

This means:

- The Church does not need to fear Satan's schemes, because his fate is sealed (Revelation 20:10).
- Evil will not have the final word—the Lamb reigns.

# B. The Victory of the Lamb Guarantees the Future Victory of the Church

- In **Revelation 19**, Jesus **returns as the Rider on the White Horse**, showing that His victory will be fully realized.
- In **Revelation 21-22**, the New Jerusalem descends, and God makes **all things new**.

#### Because the Lamb has already won:

- We can endure suffering, knowing that **our future is secure**.
- We can remain faithful, knowing that **Babylon will fall, but the New Jerusalem will last** forever.

#### N.T. Wright: The Already-But-Not-Yet Victory

N.T. Wright, in *Revelation for Everyone*, writes:

"Revelation reminds us that Jesus has already won the decisive victory, but the world has not yet caught up. The call to endurance is the call to **live now in the light of the victory that is already guaranteed.**" (*Revelation for Everyone*, p. 142)

# 3. How This Encourages Us Today

# A. We Don't Fight for Victory—We Fight from Victory

Because the Lamb has already overcome:

- We do not need to fear suffering.
- We do not need to compromise under pressure.
- We can endure, knowing that victory is already won.

*"I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world."* (John 16:33, ESV)

## B. Worship is an Act of Resistance

• Worship in Revelation is not passive—it is a declaration of victory.

- When believers worship, they proclaim the Lamb's reign in defiance of the world's powers.
- The Beast demands allegiance, but the Church declares, "Worthy is the Lamb!"

## C. Faithfulness is the Path to Overcoming

- Jesus calls His followers to conquer as He conquered (Revelation 3:21).
- This means staying faithful in hardship, resisting deception, and holding onto the truth.
- Our endurance is not in vain—Jesus has already secured the reward.

"Do not fear what you are about to suffer... Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life." (**Revelation 2:10, ESV**)

# 4. Conclusion: Why This Matters

"The Lamb has already overcome," means:

- 1. Jesus' death and resurrection secured victory over Satan, sin, and death.
- 2. The Church's suffering is not a sign of defeat but a part of sharing in Jesus' victory.
- 3. The enemy may still deceive and persecute, but his ultimate defeat is certain.
- 4. Faithfulness leads to ultimate triumph—because Jesus has already won.

## Final Thought:

The Lamb reigns. The battle is won. We endure—not to achieve victory, but to live in the victory Christ has already secured.

*"To the one who conquers I will grant him to sit with me on my throne, as I also conquered and sat down with my Father on his throne."* (**Revelation 3:21, ESV**)
